TfL Workshop

TfL came in on Thursday to run their second 'Project Guardian' workshop with it's aim to raise awareness of inappropriate behaviour that can happen on public transport.

This time it was Year 10s time in the workshop.

Some great questions were asked if they were taken through different incidents that have happened on public transport and what they can do to raise awareness, such as speaking to the bis driver, asking the victim questions such as 'what time is it?' and using the help points at tube stations. Students were also told to always tap in and out as it helps TfL to know which bus or tube they were on if an incident occurs.

They were given lots of places to report incidents on public transport, which can also be used by parents, such as:

- · Download the Railway Guardian app to report any incident
- Report the incident to the Police 999 if someone is in immediate danger, 101 or online after the event

Welcome to Careers Corner

Do you know that all Year 9-11 students will receive an impartial careers interview once a year? This is to prepare them for making their options in year 9, work experience in Year 10 and college applications in Year 11. Locked Chats. Did you know that you can hide conversations and lock them away in WhatsApp? This was a feature introduced in May 2023 and was easy to spot (if you knew how), but WhatsApp have updated the feature which makes it much more difficult to find.

In the original update you had to swipe down in the 'Chats' window to see locked chats, then input a code, fingerprint or Face ID to unlock. However, this meant that other people (parents, teachers, partners) would be able to see that you have got locked chats, even if you can't see the content. WhatsApp have just updated this (being rolled out worldwide from the beginning of December) and locked chats can now only be viewed by entering a secret code into the search bar, meaning that you will not be able to tell if there are any locked chats without knowing the code.

- Develop your employability skills to be work ready
- * There will be a duty of care to pass on any safeguarding concerns to the safeguarding team at LPS

Where will we meet?

In our dedicated careers room, which can be found on the stairway going up to E corridor. You will also have access to the careers library, prospectus and your Unifrog account

What will you be given?

- Accurate and up-to-date impartial and independent information
- The opportunity to use and discuss the outcomes from online quizzes and assessments from Unifrog
- Alternative sources of information and help if required
- A personalised action plan
- Reflection, challenge, motivation and self-belief

When will I have a careers meeting?

You will have three opportunities to meet the careers advisor:

- In Year 9 as your approach making your choices for the Key Stage 4 subjects, normally in the Spring term
- In Year 10 as you prepare for work experience, normally in the Summer term
- In Year 11 as you prepare for your post 16 options, normally in the Autums term

There are also drop in sessions available during Monday and Tuesday lunchtime in the Careers Room

How should I prepare?

Ask yourself the following:

- Where am I now?
- What ideas do I have?
- What have I explored/researched?
- What do I need help with?
- What thoughts do I have about the future?

Skatepark at Broomfield Park?

Betongpark and Broomfield Park Skatepark Group are working together to speak with local people about a potential new skatepark in Broomfield Park, Palmers Green.

Before anything is agreed, we want first to determine if a skatepark is needed in Broomfield Park, where it could be located, and what people's hopes are for this potential skatepark. We also want to explore how we would make the space inclusive, encouraging people who wouldn't usually use skateparks to feel they can.

This consultation survey is an important part of an early-stage feasibility study for the skatepark, which is required by the Council. The study is being carried out by Betongpark - depending on the results, these can then be used to seek funding and planning

permission.



My London Story

All of Year 8 had a workshop entitled 'My London Story' organised by the Museum of London. Part of the workshop discussed about what it means to be a London and what their hopes and fears are for London in the future.

Yanis said 'it has made me think about what it means to be a Londoner.'

Arben said he 'has learnt a lot of things about London, such as how good the transport links are and how many opportunities there are in London, such as the London Eye.'

Emanouela said she learnt a lot from the workshop such as London is a welcoming city for all, even if you weren't born here









The project started after a group of local parents and skateboarders came together and approached the council about the idea for a new skatepark to be built in Broomfield Park. The group felt the borough was seriously lacking a decent skatepark/facilities unlike many other places in London. They brought on board their friends, families and other wheeled sports users in the area, to form the Broomfield Park Skatepark Group and started talking to the council and the Friends of Broomfield Park about building a new skatepark for the local community.

Food Vouchers and Food Bank Support over the Christmas period


Students that are eligible for Free School Meals will receive food vouchers from the Department of Work and Pensions Household Support Fund through the London Borough of Enfield.

The Edenred vouchers are time limited and there is a voucher expiry date. The voucher cannot be reissued after the expiry date.

Parents can start ordering vouchers via Edenred from Wednesday 6th and the deadline is Wednesday 20th December. We have received an update from Enfield Council:


























Online Safety for Year 7's
