Laurel Park Business and Industry Centre Proposal

Notice is given to the London Borough of Enfield, Civic Centre, Silver Street, Enfield, EN1 3XQ that Laurel Park School proposes to add a post-16 vocational offer to the current provisions.

The vision of Laurel Park School is to develop well rounded students with the ambition and determination to excel in their lives whether this be through academic study, vocational training, or employment. Alongside this, Laurel Park School has a commitment to developing character and integrity across the school and wider community.

Opportunities are provided outside of the taught curriculum to develop core life skills, preparing our students to be proud global citizens. Laurel Park School's governing body is therefore proposing to open a sixth form to allow students to take further vocational causes for their post-16 education.

This provision will be situated within existing buildings on the main school campus at Wilmer Way, London, N14 7HY. Therefore, no special transport arrangements are required as there will be no change to the travel arrangements for the students and there is unlikely to be any change to current levels of car use.

It is proposed that the admission process for internal and external students for the new established post 16 vocational offer will open from early 2024 with pre – admissions interviews between March- April 2024.

Laurel Park is a relatively small secondary school with a family type community. For some students it is an overwhelming thought and experience having to transition again at the end of year 11 to a larger college.

Most of Laurel Park's current students go to college outside of Enfield for their post-16 studies. Having a vocational education at Laurel Park School sixth form could help to retain and support those students who wished to pursue vocational education in Enfield, as opposed to going to schools and/or colleges either within or outside of the borough.

Laurel Park School believes there is a need in the school to provide a post-16 offer to retain students and support them on their journey into Higher Education, Apprenticeships, or employment.

Secret Listeners Workshop

On Monday we welcomed Joanna Hutt from Freshwater Theatre Company for a highly interactive workshop based on the Secret Listeners of Trent Park House.

The Secret Listeners carried out important intelligence work during the Second World War. Many of the Secret Listeners were German or Austrian, and many of them were Jewish. They had left Germany to find safety in Britain.

They worked in shifts in the basement at Trent Park, a large country house in Enfield. It was their job to listen carefully to what others were talking about. They had to translate the German into English and then try to understand what was being said and whether it had any military significance.

Our Year 9 group were fascinated during the production and it prompted some excellent questions and discussions around the topic. Thank you to Joanna and the team for an excellent, informative and thought provoking session.
