
We're incredibly proud of how hard our Key Stage 3 students have worked this year, and the end of year assessments are a great opportunity to reflect on their progress so far.



Y7 NATIONAL GALLERY ART TRIP



Our Year 7 students recently enjoyed an inspiring art trip to the National Gallery. Before heading into the workshops, we had a bit of time to explore Trafalgar Square, where we took some fantastic photos in front of Nelson's Column and the grand façade of the National Gallery.

The day officially began with a unique colour-matching activity inside the gallery, where students used paint colour palettes to find matching hues in famous portraits. They were especially excited to see the official portraits of King Charles and Queen Camilla before they return to the palace.

In the next workshop, they learned about Dutch paintings and the use of natural pigments. They got hands-on experience mixing pigments from materials like chalk, dried spinach, marigold flowers, paprika, beetroot, pea flower, and spirulina. They experimented with blending these pigments to create their own unique colours, which they named themselves.

Finally, they used these custom colours to add vibrant touches to a large collaborative canvas they had been working on together. The day concluded with some free time to explore the gallery's masterpieces, making it a truly enriching experience for everyone.

























Teaching and Learning

Printing - Year 10 Graphics

This term, Year 10 Graphics students have been getting creative and hands-on with a range of printing techniques as part of their design curriculum. The unit, focused on developing practical skills and design thinking, has seen students experimenting with methods such as block printing, screen printing, and monoprinting.

Students began by exploring the history of printmaking and its relevance in modern design. They then moved on to designing their own patterns and artwork to apply in various print processes. Students also had the opportunity to work with more advanced tools in the graphics studio, using stencils and screens to create layered prints with bold colors and textures. These techniques not only helped students improve their technical abilities but also encouraged them to think critically about how visual messages are communicated through art and design. It's great to see them engage with traditional methods while applying their own modern twist. Developing these skills will be incredibly useful if they continue into senior design or even pursue creative careers.

With more lessons ahead, the Year 10 Graphics students are set to continue exploring the world of design—one print at a time.

Why Are Some Countries Rich While Others Remain Poor? Students Explore Uneven Development

Year 10 Geography students are diving into one of the most important and complex topics in Geography: Uneven Development. As part of their global studies curriculum, pupils are learning why the world is so unequal, why some countries are rich and powerful while others struggle with poverty, conflict, and underdevelopment.

Uneven development refers to the stark contrasts between wealth and living standards in different parts of the world. It's a key topic that helps students understand global patterns of income, healthcare, education, and infrastructure. This unit gives students the tools to explore that question critically. There was much debate about the historical and global causes of uneven development which led to questions around colonisation; Many countries that are now poor were once colonies of European powers. Other causes include trade imbalances, where poorer countries export cheap raw materials but import expensive manufactured goods. Some students were surprised to learn how international debt and unfair trade agreements continue to keep poorer nations from developing. Geography also plays a role. Countries that suffer frequent natural disasters like droughts, earthquakes, or floods often find it hard to build stable economies. Conflict is another factor; wars and political instability can destroy infrastructure and drive away investment.

The unit isn't just about identifying problems. Students are also learning about solutions such as fair trade, debt relief, investment in education and healthcare, and global cooperation. Many expressed a newfound interest in global issues and said they felt more empowered to make a difference. With such thoughtful engagement, it's clear these students are not only learning about the world, but beginning to think about how they can help change it



Year 8 Students Tackle French Verb Conjugation on the Road to Fluency

Year 8 French students have been hard at work this term mastering one of the most important and sometimes tricky parts of learning a new language: verb conjugation. From regular -er verbs like parler (to speak) to irregular verbs like avoir (to have) and être (to be), students have been building the foundations of French fluency one tense at a time. In class, students have been practicing how to match verbs to the correct subject pronouns je, tu, il/elle, and so on and are now using them to formulate sentences. Using interactive exercises, they've been applying these skills in real conversations and short written texts. As the term continues, students will move on to using verbs in different tenses, such as the past (passé composé) and future, helping them to talk about a wider range of experiences. With solid conjugation skills in place, Year 8 are well on their way to becoming confident French speakers. Vive le français!



Year 9 Geography Students Explore the Complexities of West Africa


Year 9 Geography students have been diving into the dynamic and diverse region of West Africa. Through maps, case studies, and lively classroom discussions, students have been uncovering what makes this part of the world unique, from its rich natural resources to its complex social and political challenges.

A major focus of the unit has been understanding the region's economy. Students learned that many West African countries rely heavily on agriculture and natural resources. Crops like cocoa, coffee, and cotton play a vital role in supporting livelihoods, especially in countries like Ghana and Côte d'Ivoire. Additionally, oil and mineral exports are major economic drivers, particularly in Nigeria, one of the region's largest economies. However, teachers have also emphasized the challenges of over-reliance on these industries, especially in areas lacking strong infrastructure or stable governance.

Another important part of the curriculum has been exploring the conflicts that have shaped and continue to affect the region. Students discussed a range of issues, from the historical impact of colonial borders to more recent struggles involving political instability, religious tensions, and resource disputes. These discussions have helped students understand how economic hardship, climate change, and weak government institutions can contribute to unrest.

Doing this topic will help students realise how connected the environment, economy, and politics are, or how much it can affect people's daily lives. They will get a better grasp of global geography but also develop empathy and critical thinking skills that they can apply to understanding the wider world.

Still the best-selling game of all time, Minecraft is a bastion of creativity and community, with hundreds of millions of players building and crafting in its almost endless world. The popularity of Minecraft among gamers of all ages means it's important to remain informed about the game, including how to play it safely and whether it's suitable for the children in your care. That's why we've created this guide explaining the risks associated with Minecraft and how to ensure a purely enjoyable gaming experience.

Minecraft's focus on creativity means that, as with any creative endeavour, it can be easy to get carried away. If your child is finding it difficult to manage their time because they're drawn in by Minecraft's gameplay loop of resource gathering and building elaborate projects, it could have a knock-on effect on their social interactions and school work. social interactions and schoolwork.

PUBLIC SERVERS AND

With public servers being so easily accessible in Minecraft, it's highly likely that children will end up chatting with strangers through the in-game text chat. Some servers even place an emphasis communication between players. While there's nothing inherently wrong with this, it does carry certain risks. In addition to the concerns around speaking with strangers online, players who host their own servers may have their IP addresses exposed, posing a further security

ADDITIONAL **PURCHASES**



Minecraft is available as a free trial on a variety of devices; however, the full game requires a one-off purchase. After that, players have the option to buy additional cosmetic upgrades or subscribe to Minecraft Realms. Realms is an entirely optional subscription service that allows users to run their own private server to play with friends. Without proper supervision, younger players may end up making unintended or excessive purchases.

Advice for Parents & Educators

CHOOSE THE RIGHT MODE

Selecting Creative or Peaceful mode allows children to play Minecraft without having to contend with enemies. It's also a great way for you to get used to playing the game with them, since the difficulty level is far lower. This allows you to work together on a long-term project, creating something special without the threat of enemies and creatures attacking you or damaging your

HOST A PRIVATE SERVER

The easiest way to find a safe server for children to play on is to make one yourself. Hosting a server prevents strangers from finding it, unless they've been given its address and password. A private server also lets you control who's allowed to enter and – if necessary – ban anyone who shouldn't be there. This is the closest equivalent to parental controls in Minecraft. Hosting a private server, however, will cost a monthly fe

TALK ABOUT STRANGERS

At some point in their lives, almost everyone will make contact with a stranger online. Talking to children about online safety, therefore, is essential – as is having a plan for dealing with any hostile or difficult people. It's important that a child knows never to tell a stranger about themselves online and that they should come to you straight away if they do encounter a problem.

RESEARCH CONTENT CREATORS

ch of Minecraft's early stages can be an exercise in frustration for players who don't know where to start. Thankfully, there's a wealth of material online and in video format to help you learn the basics. Just be mindful that some of this content may not be appropriate for children, so you should consider watching it yourself first.

PLAY MINECRAFT WITH YOUR CHILD

As a creative building tool, Minecraft makes it great fun for children to team up and construct vast buildings accompanied by imaginative landscapes, much like working with LEGO or model kits. Playing in a game mode that includes enemies can encourage critical thinking and teamwork; however, you should consider which game mode is appropriate for the child in your care
